Teach Learn Grow is a not-for-profit organisation dedicated to supporting Australian children experiencing disadvantage, and working towards a future where every child is empowered to reach their full educational potential.

This report highlights the impact of Teach Learn Grow in 2018 through the eMentor and Rural Programs.



The Rural Program provides one-on-one tutoring to students by sending volunteers out to rural and remote communities during a week-long visit, with a specific focus on mathematics, STEAM and school engagement.



The eMentor Program provides one-on-one mentoring to students in rural and remote Australia through weekly online sessions, with a specific focus on building personal skills and emotional intelligence.

- Improved student social skills



'Achieved Understanding' means a score above 75% in the end of week worksheet. 'Significant Improvement' means a 25% improvement over the week.




Empowering students to reach their potential through the appreciation of education, goal-setting and valuable working lives.


100% of our schools are from low socioeconomic areas.
